Christopher Noel Powell of Benicia CA, Vice President of REMAX Gold died of cancer on Saturday, August 11th at his home in the loving company of close family and friends.

Chris was born as Noel Christopher Powell at the University of Chicago's Lying-in Hospital in IL on September 19th, 1967 the son of Patricia Parks and William M.K. Spali. He was raised in St. Louis Missouri by Patricia and Hubert Powell along with his half brother Roman. From the get-go charisma, athleticism, and determination were his defining characteristics.
