Committed to a simple lifestyle based on her Basic Buddhist Vows, Ruth Pierce was genuinely interested in others and loved sharing stories. She was born in Cleveland, Ohio. Upon graduating from Vassar College, she ventured out to Northern California, where in 1959 she married David Merwyn Pierce in Richmond. In 1966, she received a master's degree in social work from U.C. Berkeley. Her work at the Florence Crittenden Home in San Francisco inspired her to write *Single and Pregnant* in 1970. She was passionate about sailing her boat, DAKINI, and she enjoyed a series of beloved rescue dogs. Ruth was also passionate about keeping Benicia's waterfront natural, undeveloped, and accessible to all. To that end, she helped gather signatures for a ballot initiative to change the land designation from "waterfront commercial" to "waterfront park." Her friends remember her empathy, generosity, and the warm smile across her face as she raised her eyebrows in anticipation. She is survived by many loving friends and family members.
